### A New Day

By the time we hit April, Spring is in full force. The once barren trees are growing their leaves back, the flowers are blooming with bright vivid colors, the birds are vocalizing their songs, the bees are getting busy with the explosion of pollen, and the sun beams are warm and cozy but not too hot yet. My favorite start to Spring is seeing all of the yellow Daffodils that pop up out of the ground. Colossians 3 gives us guidance as to how we can live out our worship. The beginning of the chapter says we should put to death the things of the flesh and then continues to say...

"12 Therefore, as God's chosen ones, holy and dearly loved, put on compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience, 13 bearing with one another and forgiving one another if anyone has a grievance against another. Just as the Lord has forgiven you, so you are also to forgive. <sup>14</sup> Above all, put on love, which is the perfect bond of unity. 15 And let the peace of Christ, to which you were also called in one body, rule your hearts. And be thankful. 16 Let the word of Christ dwell richly among you, in all wisdom teaching and admonishing one another through psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs, singing to God with gratitude in your hearts. <sup>17</sup> And whatever you do, in word or in deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him."

When we worship and spend time in communion with Him we grow closer to God. The inevitable outcome is that He continually changes us from the inside out - making us more like Him. This also effects how we relate to and interact with others on a daily basis. Our worship includes sharing Jesus with others too.

In the days and weeks to come I encourage you to thank God for each new day and embrace it with worship - worship between you and God, and worship as you live out your lives and interact with those around you. May you be reminded of and experience the living hope that we have in Christ in the good and hard days ahead.

April is Sexual Assault awareness month.

We all have a right to safety in our daily lives — to have our boundaries respected and make choices about what happens to our bodies — at home, school, the workplace, and in public places. That sense of wellbeing and safety can be taken away by knowing that sexual assault, harassment, and abuse are common and not always taken seriously.

The good news is that we can stop sexual abuse before it happens by addressing the bigger picture in which it occurs.

### **The Bigger Picture**

Too often, our society sends the message that sexual assault, harassment, and abuse are caused by an individual person's choices and failings — that of the victim or the perpetrator.

We should never blame victims for what happened to them — sexual assault and abuse are actions that one person chooses to inflict on another. We need to hold individuals who commit abuse accountable, but we can't stop there when it comes to ending sexual assault altogether. Focusing solely on individual perpetrators and instances of sexual assault, harassment, and abuse is often easier than facing the reality that this type of violence is widespread and common, and the driving forces behind it are hard to see.

Everyone's beliefs, values, and behaviors are continually shaped by the world around them — by unwritten rules on how to behave, laws, policies, and pop culture. For instance, weak policies or lack of accountability for those who have committed sexual assault can lead to

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an increased risk for perpetration. This means our efforts to stop sexual assault before it happens must go beyond changing individuals. We must improve expectations for how we interact with one another, strengthen policies to support survivors, and promote safety throughout communities.

### Personal Safety vs. the Bigger Picture

Sometimes when people hear about preventing sexual assault, harassment, and abuse, they

think about ways they can keep themselves safe. Prevention means much more than protecting ourselves, not to mention many factors that impact our safety are beyond our individual control. Stopping these types of violence before they happen requires us to work together to support healthy, safe, and respectful behaviors and environments.



### What You Can Do

- Improve skills around asking for consent and respecting the answer, challenge jokes that demean others, and maintain and model healthy relationships.
- Encourage children to respect others' boundaries and bodies, challenge unfair gender stereotypes, and treat others with respect.
- Improve policies and practices within faith communities, community organizations, workplaces, and schools to ensure everyone is treated fairly. Screen staff and volunteers and train them frequently on healthy behavior and boundaries.
- Create and pass legislation that supports survivors and improves equitable resources.

We can take these steps and more to work towards a safer and more equal world for future generations.







### **Stomping Out Second-Hand Smoke**

Stopping sexual assault before it happens can feel challenging — but it is possible. The social stigma about second-hand smoke is a great example of how educating the public and changing unwritten rules and expectations helped address a public health issue.

Not long ago, smoking cigarettes took place almost everywhere — restaurants, hospitals, even airplanes. Yet people nearby who breathed in the smoke were consequences. Over many years, public health professionals and youth leaders exposed the negative effects of second-hand smoke.

Thanks to a greater

understanding of these health risks, society's views about where people could smoke changed, and it became less common to see people smoking in public like with second-hand smoke, it's possible for us to make the have a society where sexual are not common.


### How Often Does Sexual Assault Occur in the United States?

- Every 68 seconds another American is sexually assaulted.<sup>1</sup>
- 1 out of every 6 American women has been the victim of an attempted or completed rape in her lifetime (14.8% completed, 2.8% attempted).4
- About 3% of American men—or 1 in 33—have experienced an attempted or completed rape in their lifetime.
- From 2009-2013, Child Protective Services agencies substantiated, or found strong evidence to indicate that, 63,000 children a year were victims of sexual abuse.<sup>5</sup>
- A majority of child victims are 12-17. Of victims under the age of 18: 34% of victims of sexual assault and rape are under age 12, and 66% of victims of sexual assault and rape are age 12-17.

### What was the survivor doing when the crime occurred?

- 48% were sleeping, or performing another activity at home
- 29% were traveling to and from work or school, or traveling to shop or run errands
- 12% were working
- 7% were attending school
- 5% were doing an unknown or other activity

#### **Understanding RAINN's statistics**

Sexual violence is notoriously difficult to measure, and there is no single source of data that provides a complete picture of the crime. On RAINN's website, we have tried to select the most reliable source of statistics for each topic. The primary data source we use is the <u>National Crime Victimization Survey (NCVS)</u>, which is an annual study conducted by the <u>Justice Department</u>. To conduct NCVS, researchers interview tens of thousands of Americans each year to learn about crimes that they've experienced. Based on those interviews, the study provides estimates of the total number of crimes, including those that were not reported to police. While NCVS has a number of limitations (most importantly, children under age 12 are not included), overall, it is the most reliable source of crime statistics in the U.S.

We have also relied on other Justice Department studies, as well as data from the Department of Health and Human Services and other government and academic sources. When assembling these statistics, we have generally retained the wording used by the authors. Statistics are presented for educational purposes only. Each statistic includes a footnote citation for the original source, where you can find information about the methodology and a definition of terms.

## ABOUT HAITI BIBLE MISSION

Just two hours by air from the US mainland, Haiti is one of the least developed countries in the world and is the poorest country in the Western Hemisphere. Haiti has a population of almost 12 million people consisting of a low income, peasant-based economy. The people are mostly African descent with the average Haitian making about \$2.25 USD per day.

Haiti Bible Mission is based in Jeremie, Haiti (1290 miles west of Port-au-Prince). The ministry focuses on empowering indigenous Haitian leaders through leadership development. This is done through discipleship, local church involvement, education community development and short-term missions. Their approach is highly relational and focuses on the most isolated and poverty stricken parts of western Haiti. They also have a heart to provide relief through meeting physical needs such as providing shelter or intervening for healthcare.

The giving that comes from you and IFBC helps to overcome the challenges of both physical and spiritual poverty. Through the work of the Haiti Bible Mission, the lives of many Haitian's are renewed, and the burden of the Haitian people is lightened by the love of Jesus Christ.
